The Streets of Midtown Aren't To Be Traveled Lightly... Without this Guide

You made it – welcome to the line! With just three weeks left before the big show, I bet you're as excited as I am! Of course, three weeks can seem like an eternity when you're waiting for a new "Star Wars" film – or if you're wandering around lost, unable to find a hot meal or the latest issue of Entertainment Weekly. So here's some valuable information to make your stay on

our favorite stretch of New York City sidewalk as fun-filled and actionpacked as possible. As a veritable Yoda with two NYLines under my belt, it's time to pass the knowledge on to you, my young padawans. Only you don't have to carry me in your backpack, just this handy little guide!

First things first: for the Jedi it is time to eat as well! You can't be having any fun when your belly is yelling at you. Below is a list I've compiled of a plethora of sit-down restaurants (when you want your seat on something softer than sidewalk), followed by some quick fixes (fast food, so you can plant yourself back on the sidewalk ASAP). Some of these establishments deliver – just give the address as 139 W. 54th St. It works... really!

Restaurants

- ▲ Lou's Café 53rd Street & 6th Avenue, SW corner. Good choice for breakfast and lunch, but a little pricier than some of the others.
- ▲ **Au Bon Pain** –55th Street between 6th & 7th Avenues, north side.
- ▲ Tad's Broiled Steaks 50th Street between 6th & 7th Avenue, north side. Check out their lunch special: \$6.99 for a strip or sirloin steak, potato or rice, garden salad and garlic bread!
- ▲ Bagel and Bean 828 7th Avenue, between 53rd & 54th Streets. (212-262-6340)
- Ray's Pizza 7th Avenue between 53rd & 54th Streets, east side. (212-974-9381)
- Star Diner 7th Avenue & 54th Street, SE corner. (212-245-3030)
- ▲ Fluffy's Café and Bakery 855 7th Avenue between 54th & 55th Streets. Breakfast, lunch and yummy desserts! (212-247-0234)
- Mars 2112 1633 Broadway at 51st Street. Blast off to a Martian eatery, just minutes away from the Ziegfeld. It's not 5-star dining, but

the nitrogen-based atmosphere will bring warm feelings to any true geek's heart.

- Pick A Bagel 57th Street & 7th Avenue, SW corner.
- Pax Wholesome Food 57th Street & 7th Avenue, NE corner. Great salads and wraps!
- ▲ Applejack Diner 55th Street & Broadway, SW corner. Great allaround diner; you can get anything there!
- ▲ 54 Broadway Café 54th Street & Broadway, NW corner. All purpose feeding frenzy! They've opened a Japanese Udon Noodle Bar • \$4.99 a bowl, available Mon-Fri 11:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. The manager assures me this café is open 25 hours a day, 8 days a week, and you just can't argue with that service!
- ▲ Seeda Thai II 309 W. 50th Street between 8th & 9th Avenues. Thai/ Vietnamese – one of the best in the area. (212-586-4040)

- Ruby Foo's 49th Street & Broadway, NE corner. Expensive, but one of the best restaurants going! Save this one for the end if you have some money left over!
- ▲ BOS 55th Street & 8th Avenue, NE corner. Great Chinese! Superb! Amazing vegetarian hot and sour soup! Get a lunch special – you'll have enough for dinner. (212-582-8887)
- ▲ Bread Factory Café 935 8th Avenue between 55th & 56th Streets. Great soups, salads, wraps and you guessed it – breads! Awesome bakery too! (212-586-2221)
- ▲ Wondee Siam 9th Avenue between 52nd & 53rd Streets. Absolutely the best Pad Thai in the area! You must go there at least once while you're here – of course they deliver, so why not let them do all the footwork? (212.459.9057)

Quick Fixes

- ▲ Starbucks 6th Avenue between 53rd & 54th Streets, east side.
- ▲ KFC/Pizza Hut/Dunkin Donuts – 50th Street between 6th & 7th Avenues, north side. Next to Tad's Broiled Steaks.

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- **Sweet and Sour** 7th Avenue between 53rd & 54th Streets, west side. Ice Cream! Candy!
- ▲ Stage Star Deli 55th Street between 6th & 7th Avenues.
- ▲ **55 Street Deli** 55th Street & 7th Avenue. NW corner. (212-333-5993)
- ▲ Burger King 777 8th Avenue, between 47th & 48th Streets. Where you can get the cool "Star Wars" tie-in toys!
- ▲ Ranch 1 Broadway between 53rd & 54th Streets, next door to "Late Night with David Letterman."

Chicken sandwiches and wraps. Almost healthy! (212-262-7171)

- ▲ Roy Rogers 53rd Street & Broadway, SE corner.
- ▲ McDonalds 51st Street & Broadwav. NW corner.
- ▲ Another **Starbucks** 51st Street & Broadway, NE corner. They will soon control your brain waves and bodily functions!
- ▲ **Blimpie** 55th Street & 8th Avenue, SW corner.
- ▲ Wendy's 8th Avenue between 55th & 56th Streets, east side.

Of course, after two weeks of fast food and Manhattan prices, you may decide you just want to pick up some groceries and make something tasty for yourself. Believe it or not, Midtown has supermarkets! Also, you can never have enough breath mints, deodorant and Jar Jar bandages, so you'll be happy to know where to find the nearby drugstores.

- ★ Ernest Klein and Company International Supermarket – 6th Avenue between 55th & 56th Streets, east side.
- ▲ Associated Supermarket 57th Street between 7th Avenue & Broadway, north side.
- ★ Westerly Natural Market 54th Street & 8th Avenue, NW corner. A



gem of market. It's one of my favorites in the city.

- ▲ Gristedes Supermarket –54th Street & 8th Avenue, SW corner.
- **Duane Reade** 56th Street & 6th Avenue, SE corner.
- ▲ **Duane Reade** (again) 57th Street & Broadway, SE corner. This one's open 24 hours a day and has a onehour photo lab.

Hopefully you'll be taking lots of pictures on the line of all your new friends and during the exciting events. If you still use film and you'd prefer not to trust your precious negatives to a drugstore developing machine, you can check out these fine establishments.

Photo Shops

- ▲ 1-Hour Fromax Photo Systems 56th Street & 6th Avenue, NW corner.
- ★ Kodak Image Center 7th Avenue between 53rd & 54th Streets, west side. Next door to Bagel and Bean. 30-minute film processing.

And you're going to need to get all the latest "Revenge of the Sith" products, right? Here's a list of some shops you might peruse for all the Star Wars goodies and some other tidbits you might want.

Geeky, Techy, Touristy

▲ Smoke Scene – 54th Street & 7th Avenue, NE corner. Sculptures, toys, action figures, comics, magazines, postcards, gum, candy and trading

cards, and all just down the block from the line!

- **FYE** 51st Street & 6th Avenue. NE corner. Get the Episode III soundtrack May 3!
- **New York Attitude Gift Shop** 7th Avenue between 54th & 55th Streets, just north of the Smoke Scene. For anybody bursting to fill up on NYC paraphernalia.
- CompUSA 57th Street & 8th Avenue, NE corner.
- Radio Shack 57th Street between 7th Avenue & Broadway, north side. To convert your PlayStation to run off a street lamp in the wee hours of the night!
- Another **Radio Shack** Broadway between 54th & 55th Streets, west side.

If you're feeling really adventurous and want to branch off into such remote sections of the city as the infamous East Village, here are a few "Star Wars"-related places you might want to visit.

Geek Pilgrimages

- ▲ Love Saves the Day 7th Street & 2nd Avenue, NW corner. The first and most important stop on this list! It is absolutely the coolest store with all sorts of old toys - everything from "Star Wars" and G.I. Joe (not just the '80s action figures mind you, but the '50s and '60s 12-inchers too) to the Smurfs, "Nightmare before Christmas," and more! They also have vintage clothes and other fun things. Definitely worth your time. Take the N/R train to the 8th Street Station and then walk east along St. Marks Place to 2nd Avenue. Turn right, and one block south you'll find it!
- ▲ Speaking of **St. Marks Place**, while you're visiting, you might want to poke your head into St. Marks Comics (new and used), Kim's Video (new and used DVDs from around the world), and Multimedia **1.0** (where you might just be able to pick up any vintage game from that old Atari "Empire Strikes Back" cartridge with the AT-ATs to those awesome handheld arcade versions of Donkey Kong and PacMan).
- ▲ Next to Love Saves the Day is **Sushi** Park – 121 2nd Ave., between 7th & 8th Streets (you'll see it - the outside facade Continued on page 5

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is all bamboo). It's not "Star Wars" related, but the prices are great and the food is even better! I highly recommend it. I go every time I'm down there.

- ▲ Continue with the Japanese motif by going upstairs to **Toy Tokyo** – 121 2nd Ave., second floor. Make sure not to blow all your cash at Love Saves the Day, because there's more "Star Wars" fun to be had here! It's a very cool place that has all sorts of American toys and Japanese imports. Elijah Wood has said how much he loves Toy Tokyo, and if you can't take the word of Frodo himself, what sort of geek are you?
- ▲ Planning to dress up as your favorite "Star Wars" character opening night? You'll find everything you need at Halloween Adventure
 104 4th Ave., between 11th & 12th Streets. Take the N/R train to the to the 14th Street/Union Square Station and then walk down Broadway two blocks until you see its Broadway entrance. Show the staff your NYLine badge anytime during the line, and you'll get a 10 percent discount.
- ▲ Love Saves the Day has cool vintage toys, and Toy Tokyo has awesome imports, but what if you just need the latest domestic toys and comics? Then it's time to hit **Forbidden Planet** – 840 Broadway at 13th Street. Take the N/R train to the 14th Street/Union Square Station and then walk down Broadway one block. Show the staff your NYLine badge anytime during the line, and you'll get a 10 percent discount.
- You want to check out the granddaddy of all toy stores? Why not check out the newly re-designed F.A.O. Schwarz – 767 5th Ave. at 58th Street. From the Ziegfeld, just walk over to 5th Avenue, turn left and head up 4 blocks to 58th Street. Very cool new design. I'm still partial to the huge floor-toceiling clock, but we can't have everything, I guess. Don't forget to check out the downstairs. They have this huge lounge area now with big, comfy couches and a gigantic plasma display where you can always find a flick on.

▲ Toys R Us – 44th Street & Broadway. It was "Star Wars" central for Midnight Madness; stop by and find out why! Take the 1/9 train from 50th Street to 42nd Street/Times Square and walk north 2 blocks. Or just walk the whole way – head south on 7th Avenue for 10 blocks and bear left when it intersects with Broadway. Be sure to check out the indoor Ferris whee!!

Of course to do all this really cool stuff, you're going to need cash – Republic Credits are no good out here! Below is a list of banks in the surrounding area.

Banks & ATMs

- Chase 57th Street & 8th Avenue, SE corner.
- CityBank 56th Street & Broadway, SE corner.
- ▲ North Fork Bank 56th Street & Broadway, SW corner.
- Amalgamated Bank 55th Street & Broadway, NW corner.
- ▲ Bank of America 52nd Street & Broadway, NW corner.
- ▲ Wachovia 54th Street between 6th & 7th Avenues – right behind you!

And finally, here's a little checklist of all the little things you may consider bringing along for the ride.

Odds and Ends

- ▲ It can get kind of chilly at night or during the day when the sun hides behind the tall buildings of Midtown, so don't forget something warm to wear – consider hats and gloves, especially if you're going to be doing an overnight shift.
- ▲ Conversely, it can get pretty darn hot during the day, so make sure you have something light to wear as well. It's always smart to layer, so you can peel things off as things heat up during the day, and put them back on when it gets chilly at night. 54th Street can go from Tatooine to Hoth in a matter of hours, so be prepared!
- ▲ If you're going to do a sleepover and you have room for it, a sleeping bag will do you wonders. It's cleaner than a tauntaun carcass, and you'll stay cozy for the few hours of shut-eye you may get.

- Bring some earplugs. You'll want them for the overnights. You'll get enough of us during the day – we won't be offended if you tune us out at night.
- ▲ Bring that iPod or whatever music device you might have.
- ▲ Toothbrush and toothpaste You never know when you'll be on national TV, and do you really want last night's pizza stuck in your teeth? (I sound like mom!)
- Raincoat Though we wish this weren't so, rain does fall from the sky from time to time. In 2002, it fell most of the time. Better to be prepared.
- ▲ Umbrella. See above.
- ▲ Sunscreen for those bright, sunny days that we hope to have in great quantities.
- ▲ A **baseball hat** wouldn't hurt.
- Sunglasses to hide your sleepdeprived eyes (and block out those savage rays from our life-giving star).
- ▲ Board games. Always a crowdpleaser.
- ▲ Pad and paper to write home to loved ones (oh wait, this isn't summer camp?)
- Any portable video game system you may have.
- Camera and lots of film or a few flash cards – you never know when a photo-op will pop up!
- The **book** you happen to be reading currently.
- Cell phone. Contact the outside world every once in a while. They have interesting things to say. Sometimes.
- If you have a portable battery-powered fan, it could prove useful on blistering days. You'll also make lots of friends!
- ▲ Lots of enthusiasm! Bring your energy · we're going to have an amazing time this year with plenty of great activities and events.

An Outlander's Guide to Navigating the Bright Center of the Universe - NYC

So you're coming in from out of town, yes? Some of you are coming from other states, some from other countries, and a few of you will be arriving from the Outer Rim territories. If this is your first visit to the Big Apple then please

read on... if not, then this is not the article you are looking for... you can go about your business... move along, move along...

It's true – NYC can have a strong effect on the weakminded. So make sure you keep yourself informed and updated on the best ways to get around. The most important things come first - if you are flying into one of the three airports that directly serve NYC, here's how you get to the Ziegfeld Theatre.

Newark-Liberty International

The easiest way to get to NYC from the Newark Airport is with AirTran. The trains go directly to Penn Station; from there you can get a transport (subway, cab) to 54th Street, or wherever you're going. More information on the service can be found at http://www.airtrainnewark.com/

To drive from Newark, take the New Jersey Turnpike north and follow signs for the Lincoln Tunnel. Bear left after the tunnel, and turn left onto Dyer Avenue, which you'll follow until you reach 42nd Street. Turn right on 42nd Street and drive to 8th Avenue. Turn left on 8th Avenue and drive uptown to 54th Street. Turn right on 54th Street, and after you've crossed Broadway and 7th Avenue, start looking for the tents and lightsaber fights.

Kennedy International Airport

If you're one of our international visitors, chances are you'll be arriving at Kennedy. Public transportation options are available, and can be found at http://www.panynj.gov/aviation/jfkpubtransframe.html. Also, if you want to take a taxi from JFK, the fare is a flat rate of \$45 (plus tip) to anywhere in Manhattan.

Driving from JFK, take I-678 north toward the Grand Central Parkway. Take the Grand Central towards LaGuardia Airport/Triboro Bridge. Stay on the Grand Central, past Shea Stadium on your left. The parkway will split a few times... stay on target. You'll know you're headed in the right direction if you go past LaGuardia Airport and it is on your right. Once you've passed it, follow the directions from LaGuardia to reach the bright center of the universe.

LaGuardia International Airport

Public transportation options can be found at http://www.panynj.gov/aviation/lgapubtransframe.htm. Depending on traffic, a cab ride from LaGuardia to Midtown Manhattan will cost approximately \$20 to \$25 (plus tip).

If you drive from LaGuardia, take the Grand Central Parkway west towards the city. Exit at Astoria Boulevard and follow the signs for the Queensboro (59th Street) Bridge. Use the *lower* level of the bridge, and exit onto 2nd Avenue. Take 2nd Avenue downtown to 55th Street. Turn right on 55th Street and follow it to 7th Avenue. Turn left onto 7th Avenue,



staying in the left lane for one block. Turn left onto 54th Street, and look for

the Jedi in front of the hot dog cart - you'll know you're in the right place.

Parking

If you are a Hutt gangster and can afford a rental car, or you're just driving into the city from your home, you might want to take a moment and figure how much you're going to spend on parking. Sure, you'll find plenty of places to park your car in and around the Ziegfeld - the theater sits atop a parking garage. Problem is, most of 'em cost more than you could possibly imagine. There's no long-term parking for private automobiles on 54th Street, so a garage is your best bet. If you arrive before a certain time, usually 8 a.m. you'll get a break on long term. Plan to spend at least \$50/day on parking at the Midtown garages.

But, as Obi-Wan Kenobi might say, there are alternatives to parking in the expensive Midtown lots. Garages in Queens are only a 25-minute subway ride to the Ziegfeld, and you can park in those for a more reasonable \$15/day. One such garage can be found at 47th Street and Queens Boulevard, a half-block from the 46th Street station for the #7 train. Take the Manhattan-bound #7 to Queensboro Plaza, transfer there to the N/W and ride three stops to the 57th Street Station. If you board at the front of the train, you'll emerge on 55th Street; simply walk south to 54th Street and then turn left and walk east until you find the Ziegfeld.

If you feel the urge to tempt the dark side and use metered parking in the city streets, you will do well to visit http://www.ci.nyc.ny.us/html/dof/html/parknyc.html. Here you will find the detailed rules on parking in NYC. Learn them, know them, live them, make them a part of your psyche or you will end up have to spend an obscene amount of money (and at least a half-day away from the line) to get your car out of impound after it has been towed. Don't laugh, it happened to a line member in '02, and he could have seen "Attack of the Clones" at the Ziegfeld 37.5 times for what it cost to regain possession of his car!

Ground Transportation

For those of you, who will be arriving in NYC by train or bus, you will arrive at one of three locations – the Port Authority, Grand Central or Penn Station.

If you arrive via the Metro North trains, you'll find yourself at Grand Central Station. Find the subway and take the Shuttle (S) Train to 42nd Street/Times Square. Once there, hop the N/R/Q/W train and follow the instructions in the next paragraph to get to the Ziegfeld.

Outlander's Guide

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If you come into the city by bus, you'll end up at the **Port Authority** on 8th Avenue between 40th and 42nd Streets. Follow the signs to the subway and walk through the underground passage to N/R/Q/W train at 42nd Street/Times Square and take it uptown to the 57th Street Station. If you board at the end of the train, you'll emerge on 55th Street; simply walk south to 54th Street and then turn left and walk east until you find the Ziegfeld.

If you come via Amtrak, the LIRR or New Jersey Transit trains, you'll arrive at **Penn Station**. Simply take the 1/9 Train to the 50th Street Station. The First thing you'll notice is a pretty nifty Alice In Wonderland mosaic on the station walls. Then, when you get above ground, you'll walk east one block to 7th Avenue. Once you're on 7th Avenue, turn left and head north until you reach 54th Street. At 54th Street, take a right (east) and come find us at Ziegfeld. We'll be the ones with the fake lightsabers.

Below is a list of the nearby subway trains and their entrances/exits. Keep this handy if you decide to explore the city and want to return to a station near the Ziegfeld:

- ▲ F Train Northwest and southwest corners of 57th Street and 6th Avenue; northwest corner of 56th Street and 6th Avenue; southwest and southeast corners of 56th Street and 6th Avenue
- ▲ 1/9 Train Northwest/east and southwest/east corners of 50th Street and Broadway
- ▲ B/D/E Trains North and south corner of 53rd Street on the East Side of 7th Avenue
- N/R/Q/W Trains Northwest/east and southwest/east corner of 55th Street and 7th Avenue and northwest/east and southwest/east corner of 57th Street and 7th Avenue
- C/E Trains Northwest/east and southwest/east corner of 50th Street and 8th Avenue

Whatever you do, make sure that you get yourself a MetroCard. If you are

planning on staying in the area for a number of days I recommend the 7day unlimited ride pass. For complete information on MetroCards, subway maps and schedules, visit the NYC Metropolitan Transit Authority website at http://www.mta.info

Accommodations

I'm coming from Washington, D.C., but have family in the suburbs so I won't have to find a hotel room. Not that it's a big deal; if there is one thing the NYC area has, it's hotel rooms. That said, you might want to shy away from getting a room in Manhattan. They are pricey, small and, oh, did I mention pricey?

Some of you may have hotel rooms reserved, but if you don't and you want to save some dough, you might want to think about booking a room in New Jersey. I know what you're thinking...New Jersey? What a desolate place this is! Well, if sleeping someplace desolate helps you save some coin for a second or third viewing of "Revenge of the Sith," then why not?

A room in nearby Jersey City goes for about \$67 a night. Sadly, none of the hotels I perused serves droids or lists blue milk on the room service menu. From the hotel, you can walk to the PATH trains, which will take you to 33rd Street in Manhattan. From there you can take the N, R, Q, or W trains, from the 34th Street Station up to 57th Street and 7th Avenue. Walk three blocks down and one block over (just listen to the sounds of lightsabers clashing, or more specifically, people making the sound of lightsabers clashing). That's one option of many.

Another option for a bed might be to check out the number of hostels in the city. Believe me, there are plenty around and most can fit four people on the low end and ten-plus on the high end in a room. Prices are usually between \$25 and \$75 a night; you'll pay more for hostels closer to Midtown, private rooms and a rooms with private bath. If you're not afraid of a little communal living, you can really economize. At the very least a hostel is a good option if you just need a break for a few hours and want to squeeze in a hot shower. Etc...
